



A Study of Brookings County, South Dakota

Brookings County in extreme east-central South Dakota was one of the first counties in Dakota Territory, being created in 1862 and formally organized on Jan 21, 1871. It is bordered on the east by the state of Minnesota, on the north by both Deuel and Hamlin Counties, on the west by Kingsbury County, and on the south by the counties of Lake and Moody.





The book *South Dakota Post Offices* (1) notes that the county was named for Judge Wilmot W. Brookings, one of the earliest Minnehaha County pioneers. Born at Woodwich, Maine, he graduated from Bowdoin College, studied law, and was admitted to the bar in 1857. He came to Sioux Falls in August of that year and was immediately given

charge of the interests of the Western Town Company. At that time, Sioux Falls consisted of a few rude cabins in an Indian-inhabited wilderness and had a population of 16 colonists, ten representing the Western Town Company and six the Dakota Land Company.

South Dakota Geographic Names, by Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve (2) relates a great story about Judge Brookings. Early in February, 1858 while on a trip in the interests of his company, Brookings fell from his horse into Split Rock River. It was about seven o'clock in the evening, and with the temperature hovering around 30 below zero his only chance was to run for his life. All through the night he struggled desperately on, and finally reached Sioux Falls


at nine o'clock the next morning, utterly exhausted and badly frozen. Gangrene set in, and as a last desperate resort young Dr. Phillips decided to amputate both legs below the knees. Lying on a rude bunk in his floorless cabin and without the aid of anesthetic, Brookings had his feet removed with a large butcher knife and a small saw. He not only survived the experience but entirely regained his health and took an active part in the development of the Territory.

Doane Robinson's *Encyclope-dia of South Dakota* (3) provides additional detail on the county, "first set-tled by Franklin J. DeWitt at Medary, 1857; abandoned, 1858; mod-

ern settlement Nels O. Trygstad, at Medary, 1869....Medary continued as the county seat until 1879, when construction of the Northwestern railroad was followed by the birth of the towns along that line. A county seat fight that year, unopposed by Medary, but joined in by Aurora, Brookings and Volga, resulted in favor of Brookings."

Ahnberg (1920-1937)

Ahnberg was established on Dec 7, 1920 with Andrew B. Raad as first postmaster. It was discontinued Dec 31, 1937 with mail to Arlington. The proposed name for the office was "Como". According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Ahnberg "was five miles southeast of Arlington, and was formerly called Como and is still referred to occasionally by that name. Reasons for the two names, however, are unknown."(2)




Ahnberg, S. Dak. (Dec 31, 1937) last day of office postmark on postcard of philatelic use

Argo (1880-1903)

The post office at Argo was opened May 9, 1880 with George Headley as its first postmaster. The office was discontinued Feb 28, 1903 with mail being routed to Toronto. No reference could be located as to why the office was named Argo.

Athel Wold (1892-1901) - NKC

The post office at Athel Wold was established on Mar. 25, 1892 with Erick Erickson as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Sep. 14, 1901 with mail to Bruce. Proposed name was Tetonka. No reference could be found as to why the office was named Athel Wold.



Aurora (1880-Open)

The post office at Aurora was established on Jan. 7, 1880 with Byron J. Kelsey as first postmaster. It is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, there were two explanations for the naming of Aurora. The first and most likely version is that it was named by Mrs. W. R. Stowe of the near-by town of Brookings for her former home, Aurora, Illinois, which in turn was named for Aurora, New York. The other explanation is that at the time of the founding of the town in 1880 the pioneer settlers, feeling this was to be the dawn of a new day for them, named the town Aurora because it is the name of the Roman goddess of the dawn⁽²⁾.

Bainbridge (1879-1884)

The post office at Bainbridge was established on Dec. 10, 1879 with Miles White as first postmaster. It was discontinued on Aug. 18, 1884 with mail to Barton. Proposed name was Medway. No reference was found as to why the office was named Bainbridge.

Barton (1880-1886)

The post office at Barton was established on Feb. 12, 1880 with William Dricken as first postmaster. On May 25, 1886 the post office name was changed to White. No reference was found as to why the office was named Barton.

Bloomington (1878-1880) - NKC

The post office at Bloomington was established on Dec. 4, 1878 with Ingebregt Mikkelson as first post-master. The post office was discontinued on Feb. 9, 1880 with mail to Volga. No other information is found on this office.

Brookings (1879-Open)

The post office was established on Dec. 5, 1879 with George W. Hopp as first postmaster. It is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Brookings was first called Ada but when the town was platted in 1879 the name was changed to honor Judge Wilmot W. Brookings, one of the outstanding pioneers of the state. The new name was suggested by an early settler, W. H. Skinner. The town became a combination of Ada, Medary and Fountain; for soon after Brookings was founded the other towns were abandoned and their buildings were moved to the new site⁽²⁾.

Bruce (1883-Open)

The post office name was changed from Thoms to Bruce on Nov. 5, 1883 with Edward F. Reynolds as first postmaster. It is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Bruce was first called Lee when it was founded in 1881, but was renamed in 1883 for the son of one of the early North Western railroad officials

A second derivation is that it was named for B.K. Bruce, a well-known Negro statesman and friend of Roscoe Conkling, who was United States Senator from New York when the town was founded⁽²⁾.




Bruce, Dak. Mar 6, 1888 standard 27mm plain circle postmark on cover to Montana Territory

Bushnell (1885-1972)

The post office name was changed from Fountain to Bushnell on Jan. 26, 1885 with Alex W. Davis as first postmaster. This post office was changed to a rural branch of Brookings between 1972 and 1974. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Bushnell was named for Frank E. Bushnell, owner of the land on which the depot was erected. The town was founded in 1904.⁽²⁾

Clare (1883-1885) - NKC

The post office at Clare was established on May 17, 1883 with Clarence E. West as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Jan. 12, 1885 with mail to Barton. No other information was found on this office.

Elkton (1882-Open)

The post office name was changed from Ivanhoe to Elkton on Jul. 21, 1882 with Andrew W. Blanchard as first postmaster. This is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Elkton was platted in 1880 by the Rock Island Railroad Company and named for Elkton, Maryland, the former home of the official of the line. (2)



Flandreau (1871-1873)

This post office was established on Jul.11, 1871 with David Faribault as first postmaster. The post office was moved from Brookings County to Moody County in 1873. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Flandreau was named to honor Judge Charles E. Frandrau of St. Paul, Minnesota. An "e" has since been inserted in the name. It was settled in 1857 but the following year the inhabitants were driven out by the Indians. It was resettled in 1859 by 25 families of civilized Sioux Indians, and in 1869 they ere joined by 15 additional families. It was next settled by whites in 1872. (2)



Fountain (1878-1885)

The post office was established on Jul. 30, 1878 with Chauncey A. Kelsey as first postmaster. The post office name was changed to Bushnell on Jan. 26, 1885. Fountain was named such because of the several springs or "fountains" that were present. (4)

Grant (1879/1900) - NKC

The post office at Grant was established on Jun. 10, 1879 with Easton O. Rice as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Dec. 14, 1885 with mail to Bruce. It was re-established on Jun. 30, 1890 and discontinued for good on Jul. 31, 1900 with mail to Argo. No reference could be found as to why it was named Grant.


The post office at Harton was established on Jun. 20, 1877 with Olaus Pederson as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Dec. 2, 1878 with mail to Medary. No other information was found on this office.

Ivanhoe (1880-1882)

The post office at Ivanhoe was established on Jun 16, 1880 with Andrew W. Blanchard as first postmaster. The name was changed to Elkton on Jul. 21, 1882. No reference could be found as to why it was named Ivanhoe.

The post office was established on Aug. 19, 1873 with William H. Packard as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Feb 9, 1880 with mail to Medary. No reference could be found as to why it was named Lake Village.

The post office at Laketon was established on Jan. 25, 1886 with Warren W. Pay as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Feb 9, 1901 with mail to Arlington. No reference could be found as to why it was named Laketon.

Medary (1872-1883)

The post office at Medary was established on Feb. 8, 1872 with Martin Trygstad as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Jan. 31, 1883 with mail to Brookings. The town was named for Samuel A. Medary, who was governor of Minnesota from April, 1857 to May, 1858.⁽⁴⁾

<u>Modina (1878-1879) - NKC</u>

The post office at Modina was established on Sep. 20, 1878 with Stewart Randy as first postmaster. The post office name was changed to Renshaw on Feb. 3, 1879. No other information was found on this office.

Mondale (1879-1879) - NKC

The post office at Mondale was established on Apr. 14,1879 with Ever Peterson as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Oct. 17, 1879 with mail to Fountain. No other information was found on this office.

New Denmark (1878-1879) - NKC

The post office was established on Dec. 19, 1878 with Henry Bohlke as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Oct. 14, 1879 with mail to Lake Village. No reference could be found as to why it was named New Denmark.



Prairie Farm (1876-1901)

The post office at Prairie Farm was established on Jan. 4, 1876 with Henry Peterson as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Jul. 31, 1901 with mail to Henricks, Minnesota. Discontinuance order of Feb. 15, 1897 was rescinded. No reference could be found as to why it was named Prairie Farm.

Renshaw (1879-1879)

The post office name was changed from Modina to Renshaw on Feb. 3, 1879 with Erick Nelson as first postmaster. The post office name was changed from Renshaw to Volga on Dec. 2, 1879. Renshaw was named for Joseph Renshaw Brown, a prominent Minnesota Territory politician in 1857. (4)

Sherman (1878-1884) - NKC

The post office at Sherman was established on Jan. 16, 1878 with Joseph K. Miller as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Nov. 25, 1884 with mail to Barton. No reference could be found as to why it was named Sherman.

Sinai (1891/Open)

The post office at Sinai was established on Jan. 27, 1891 with Nicholas O. Bursvold as the first post-master. The post office was discontinued on Sep. 30, 1901 with mail to Arlington. The post office was re-established on Apr. 23, 1907 and is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, Sinai was founded in 1907. The town and the township received their names from the nearby Lake Sinai. (2)

Sterling (1880-1880) - NKC

The post office at Sterling was established on Jan. 20, 1880 with Charles A. Batsel as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Jun. 14, 1880 with mail to Oakwood. No other information was found on this office.

Thoms (1883-1883) - NKC

The post office at Thoms was established on Jul. 24, 1883 with Edward Lee as the first postmaster. The post office name was changed to Bruce on Nov. 5, 1883. No other information was found on this office.

Volga (1879-Open)

The post office name was changed from Renshaw to Volga on Dec. 2, 1879 with Erick Nelson as the first postmaster. Volga is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, South Dakota Geographic Names, Volga was named, according to The Volga Tribune golden jubilee edition, August 22, 1929, for the Volga River in Russia by North Western railroad officials, either for the purpose of attracting Russian settlers to the new town or because the Missouri River, commonly called the "Big Muddy," was the railroad company's goal and Volga means "Great River." Another explanation advanced by the newspaper is the some railroad official named it for the town and river of that name in eastern Iowa. It was platted in 1879-80.⁽²⁾



West End (1873-1873) - NKC

The post office was established on Jan. 31, 1873 with Frederic W. Pettigrew as first postmaster. The post office was discontinued on Jul. 31, 1873 with mail to Flandreau. This area is now located in Moody County but at the time of operation of this post office it was in Brookings County. In 1872 there was a village of one store, two dwellings & a church, total patrons 200. No other information was found on this office.

White (1886-Open)

The post office name was changed from Barton to White on May 24, 1886 with Henry E. Hendricks as first postmaster. This is still an operating post office. According to Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve, in her book, *South Dakota Geographic Names*, White was named for W.H White, a pioneer who owned the town site. It was platted in 1884.⁽²⁾



Contents of the Postcard

The featured postcard with a MAR 11, 1911, 4 bar cancel from Scenic, S. DAK is addressed to Miss Eleanor Irving, Humboldt, S.D. The postcard itself contains no written message. A flower still life appears on the picture side of the postcard, and this side also contains an affixed, small envelope, which is labeled "A Note From Scenic, South Dakota." Fortunately, the original note has remained in the envelope for nearly 100 years and is clearly legible for such tiny writing.

Well I suppose you will be somewhat surprised when you get this note. I don't know if I should have sent it to you or not, but I can't help it. I have just got to send it. Jess told me you had left about a week after that time I after I came after you, but heard later you had not left for 3 or 4 weeks later.


Gee Eleanor it is lone-some here now. I just wish you were here. It was not half so bad when you were here.

Now Eleanor if you don't write to me I will just fly all to pieces.

I suppose you are having a big time now.

I have not forgot you but remain as before, your friend

Arthur Anderson is listed as a resident of Scenic, Pennington County, South Dakota, in the 1910 census. Born in 1883, Arthur would have been 27-28 years old at the time he sent the postcard. I could find no record of Eleanor Irving in the 1910 census for Humboldt, Minnehaha County, South Dakota. The contents of the postcard demonstrate Arthur's affection for Eleanor, but only further research will reveal if their relationship continued.
